

Reflections of the Week

Come to the Feast

Why would invited guests refuse to come to a wedding? Free food and drink, music and dancing--what's not to like? Apparently the king in Jesus' parable had the same questions. By this time, Jesus knew that many of the Jewish leaders would not accept the invitation to follow him. As we know, after the Resurrection, the disciples began to spread the good news not only to other Jews, but to anyone who would listen. The church began to grow, much faster than they expected.

One reason the leaders in Israel did not accept Jesus was his association with sinners. They did not understand that God calls sinners to repent and be forgiven. Since they thought of themselves as holy, they were not interested in forgiveness. Ordinary people, who knew they were sinners, were attracted by the offer of forgiveness. Many of them repented and came to be baptized. As the parable says, they filled the banquet hall.

Jesus calls us today to come to the same feast. But there are still people who think they have no need for Jesus. So what about the man in the parable who came in street clothes? The wedding garment was a symbol of the baptismal gown, the sign of new life in Christ. This man symbolizes those who "come to the feast" without repenting of their sins.

We can be like that man sometimes. We come to church arguing with our spouse on the way. We bring our prejudices, lies, anger, and selfishness--with no intention of doing anything about them. We come with the attitude that says, "I'm here, aren't I? That should be good enough." But it isn't, for the feast we come to is not a wedding to join husband and wife. It joins God to humanity. God's Son came to unite us all to Himself. By dying for our sins, Jesus calls us to come back to God. So repentance is not just a change of clothing; it is a change of heart, a change in how we live. It is our ticket to the banquet. It is our way of saying, "I know I don't deserve this, but thanks for letting me share the feast."

Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

The Question of Dispensation

When Covid19 first closed down our churches, the Bishop of Orange, Kevin W. Vann, extended a dispensation (the relaxation of a merely ecclesiastical or Church law in a particular case) from the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation until such time as it is deemed safe to have large gatherings at Mass. This was necessary since the faithful would not be able to physically attend Mass. However, since the Bishop has no authority to dispense from a Divine Law, in this case, the commandment requiring us to keep the Lord's Day holy, one would still have to fulfill this by either watching a Sunday Mass on television or via live-stream or by spending at least 30 minutes in prayer, saying the Rosary, reading the Scriptures or participating in another pious activity.

After a few months, the churches were re-opened using social distancing, maximum capacity guidelines for attendance and guidelines for sanitization set by Bishop Kevin Vann and the State. Shortly thereafter, we were informed we could no longer worship inside the church; instead, we would need to celebrate our Masses outdoors, again with the same guidelines as before. And after the re-opening of the churches, the dispensation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation was still extended to the faithful. This was meant to include the following people:

- Those who are over the age of 65;
- Those who have an underlying health condition;
- Those who are truly fearful that they might contract the virus; in this case, "truly fearful" is defined as those who have not gone out to a restaurant or visited people with whom they do not live since March, 2020.
- Those who are sick, including those who have tested positive for the coronavirus and those who were exposed for fifteen consecutive minutes or more to one who tested positive for Covid-19.

Unfortunately, some people are simply taking advantage of the Bishop's dispensation and not attending Mass at all. While this is perfectly acceptable for people who fall into one of the categories above, it is not for those who have returned to shopping, are going out to restaurants, etc. If these people are comfortable in those types of situations, they should also feel comfortable attending Mass on Sundays and Holy Days.

In addition, whether one physically attends Mass or not, financial support of one's parish is essential. The faithful are expected to adhere to the expectations laid out in canon 222 §1, that is, "to assist with the needs of the Church."
